



LUMS-McGill Social Enterprise Development Centre underwent some tremendous work due to a lot of activity taking place in the centre in the last three months regarding all components of SEDC. Apart from very significant meetings, forums and reports, SEDC materialized many of its plans in order to define future work plan and strategies.

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SEDC

The 'Social Sector Action Plan 2007' Symposium held on 13-14 April was a success in the true spirit of the word. The event was hosted by Social Enterprise Development Centre (SEDC) in order to celebrate as well as evaluate SEDC's efforts in the development sector through its training programmes, research based network and consultancies.

The two-day symposium was attended by civil society leaders, economists, and representatives from donor agencies. It brought together some 250 plus stakeholders of SEDC from all over the country, along with prominent personalities engaged in the development sector of Pakistan. Donor agencies/organizations such as Canadian International Development Agency (CIDA), USAID, CITI Foundation and J. E. Austin participated in panel discussions to look into the scope of funding social development programmes in Pakistan. Also present at the symposium were Dr. Peter Schneider from McGill University, Canada and Dr. Raafat Saade from Concordia University, Canada.

LUMS-McGill SEDC's Social Sector Action Plan 2007

The 'Social Sector Action Plan 2007' focused on presentations and panel discussions that analyzed the input of SEDC in building the capacity of NGO personnel in various fields. The inaugural session opened with Dr. Syed Zahoor Hassan, Vice Chancellor LUMS, giving the welcome address. Dr. Zahoor termed the LUMS-McGill SEDC as the 'Conscience of LUMS' for its participation in nation building activities through strengthening the capacity of social organizations. He mentioned that the expanding NGO sector was itself facing new challenges which would be addressed by enhancing the managerial capacity of NGO organizations.

Mr. Razak Dawood, Rector LUMS and former Commerce Minister, said that change in Pakistan had to come from the grass roots level, and there was a need to enhance the capacity of social sector organizations. He stressed the importance of improving the capacity and capability of NGOs in order to bring about a meaningful change in the quality of life of poor people.

Addressing the second day's session, Mr. Javed Jabbar, former Federal Minister and Chairperson IUCN, laid stress on the need to ensure sustainability of a number of NGOs and other social sector organizations operating in Pakistan. Mr. Javed Jabbar said that volunteer work had long been missing from the social development scene of Pakistan. He was of the view that without volunteer work, sustainability and smooth operations of social sector organizations was not possible.

Other speakers urged the local corporate sector to operate as socially responsible entities and facilitate the NGOs in their commendable efforts for social uplift. Social sector professionals not only highlighted issues, challenges, scope and future strategies in the social sector of Pakistan, but also inspired the audience and helped them to widen their horizons. SEDC trainees, who had been receiving training from SEDC in various capacities for the past six years, shared their experiences with other participants while giving their feedback to SEDC.

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You may have an insight into the proceedings of the symposium:-

a) NGO Heads Perspective - A Panel Discussion:

Dr. Jawaid Abdul Ghani, Professor and Dean of Suleman Dawood School of Business facilitated the session. Panelists included Mr. Ali Hassan Habib WWF- Pakistan, Dr. Faisal Sultan Shaukat Khanum Memorial Cancer Hospital, Ms. Khawar Mumtaz Shirkat Gah, Mr. Nadeem Fazil Ayaz Action Aid Pakistan, Mrs. Seema Aziz CARE Foundation, Mr. Shoaib Sultan Khan Rural Support Programmes Network (RSPN) and Mrs. Souriya Anwar SOS Children's Villages of Pakistan. They discussed the challenges being faced by their organizations in relation to projects, funding/sustainability issues and human resource concerns. They also shared the status of hiring in their respective organizations for the past few years, what is to be expected in terms of hiring for the near future and the ideal candidate to work in their organization.

b) Training for Development Programme Discussion:

Dr. Jamshed H. Khan, Associate Professor and Associate Dean Executive Education of Production & Operations Management and Computer Applications at SDSB facilitated this session. The TDP graduates, panelists who gave presentations, included Mr. Asmat Ullah CHIP Islamabad, Ms. Fauzia Matloob Pakistan Voluntary Health & Nutrition Association (PAVHNA), Mr. Khawaja Muhammad Usman National College of Business Administration, Muhammad Nadeem Dogar Consultant Education and Health and Ms. Salma Zaidi Syed Assistant Professor and Co-Manager Child Care Resource Centre at Government College of Home Economics, Lahore. In their presentations they highlighted the challenges they faced in their work as a trainer, how the TDP was helpful in overcoming the challenges and its role in their career growth. They also shared the number of trainings they had organized after the TDP and cases they had written with the LUMS-SEDC coordinators.

c) Interactive Dialogue:


An interactive dialogue followed the discussions in which the SEDC tasks and their positive effects were discussed. The participants of the dialogue were Azmat Malik, LUMS faculty member and Task Leader On-the-Job Assistance, SEDC, Ms. Kashmali Khan, LUMS faculty member and Task Leader Gender Sensitization Task, SEDC and Dr. Ali Cheema, LUMS faculty member. The participants gave details of their tasks as well as what the tasks contributed in social sector development so far. The discussion included a Question & Answer Session in which the Symposium participants shared their concerns with the dialogue team.

d) The Donor Agencies Panel Discussion:

The panelists included Yasin Janjua (CIDA), Dr. Warren Weinstein J. E. Austin Associates Inc., Jeffrey Haeni USAID and Zubyr Soomro Citi Foundation. They discussed the various development projects and social sector programmes their agencies have funded and the future ventures these agencies will be interested in investing in.

They discussed the challenges they had been facing before attending SEMP and the manner in which SEMP helped them in their professional/personal lives and career growth. They also guoted the instances where they applied the course learnings.

f) DSSO Panel Discussion:

This panel had Dr. Muhammad Ajmal, Rural Support Programme Network Islamabad, Mrs. Sarkar Abbas, Member District Council Rawalpindi, Mobashir Ahmed Cheema Wing Commander (R) and former Tehsil Nazim Gujranwala, Shahid Ali Haider Tehsil Nazim Shah Kot, Nankana and Munaza Hashmi, Member District Council Multan. They overviewed the challenges and issues they had to face at their work places. They also complemented DSSO trainings that proved quite beneficial in overcoming these challenges skillfully. Some suggestions were also presented by DSSO panelists in order to improve the programme curriculum to make it more focused and subject-oriented.

g) SEDC Symposium Musical Eve:

On the eve of April 13, the SEDC team hosted a lavish dinner for the attendants of the Social Sector Action Plan 2007. The venue was the lawn adjacent to the Library and the theme for the event was traditional, ethnic followed by a musical programme. The musical programme started with a short instrumental performance by the "Shahnai Band". The band constituted of 10 instrumentalists and was conducted by the maestro Mr. Jaffer Hussain.

They were followed by an entertaining performance by the renowned play back singer and vocalist Tauseef Dar, who sang contemporary Indian and Pakistani songs. The night concluded with the sweet, melodious voice of Sarah Raza Dar and Rahat Anjum who captivated the audience with popular ghazals and kafis. The musical programme and dinner went parallel and gave the participants of Symposium ample time to relax in the mid of a serious and tightly scheduled event.



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March 30th, 2007 Gender Awareness Workshop

The venue of the workshop was LUMS, Rausing Executive Development Centre (REDC).

The workshop began with Mr. Javaid William, Programme Manager SEDC who welcomed the participants whereas Ms. Saba Wallace, Gender Officer SEDC introduced the topic and objective of the workshop.

The workshop meant to make participants establish and participate in an appropriate context to think critically about and evaluate attitudes and beliefs about gender. It intended to foster the sense of honesty, reflection, critical thinking and openness. JPMC Meeting, Montreal, Canada



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Javaid William, Manager Social Enterprise Development Centre visited McGill University, Canada in March along with Rabia Moazzam Khan, Budget & Finance Officer Social Enterprise Development Centre for the Annual Joint Project Management Committee Meeting. The series of meetings was held with CIDA and McGill University's representatives, who included Dr. Peter Schneider, Dr. Raafat Saade, Peter Hoffman, Blaine Marchand, Colette Chomsky and Ekaterina Loban.

The visit was a success in terms of feedback from CIDA Monitoring Team that visited SEDC earlier in February 2007. The CIDA Monitoring Team has expressed their complete confidence in the current policies and work plans of SEDC. Approval of the work plan 2007-2008 along with its budget was the other big achievement of SEDC representatives visiting McGill University. The meetings focused on the SEDC financial reports of last year and the SEDC Finance & Budget Officer briefed them about the issues she was having in budget handling. The highlight of the visit was discussions on Impact Assessment & SEDC Symposium 2007 'Social Sector Action Plan'.



The SEDC team members gave overview of the upcoming SEDC Symposium in these meetings. Furthermore, the Impact Assessment initiated at SEDC for assessment of different tasks was brought to light by Javaid William, the manager SEDC. Future strategy and financial sustainability of the centre were the key areas discussed in the series of meetings.

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SEDC Web Portal Updates

A new feature called 'This Week's Hot Debate' has been added to the SEDC Web Portal. It allows SEDC web users to discuss various current social issues facing our society. It is expected that the platform would serve as a valuable tool to generate healthy discussions on the web as well giving SEDC participants a chance to interact with each other.

Disaster Management System (DMS)

The Flood Module related to DMS has been launched. Several social sector organizations are using the DMS for entering the data and details of the Flood of 2006. (http://www.sedc.org.pk)

Few other functions are being added in the current Disaster Management System that would help in searching the missing persons, disaster victims, managing and administrating various organizations and fields camps and to assist them in their proper distribution of resources.

There is a plan to integrate an online Geographical Information System (GIS) into the Disaster Management System (DMS). When implemented, GIS would be a helpful tool for NGOs/CBOs to access different types of geographical information about the rural and urban areas like administrative boundaries, road networks, water bodies and features like schools, hospitals, Basic Health Unit (BHUs), Adult Literacy Centres (ALCs) and Non-Formal Schools etc.

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DTM Bibliography & Brochure now available!

The teaching material developed by Development of Teaching Material (DTM) component of SEDC focuses on the evolving role and performance of NGOs in Pakistan and their operational characteristics. This material has contextual relevance not only for the Indo-Pakistan subcontinent, but also for other developing countries in Asia, Africa and South America, where similar issues and concerns have emerged due to similar socio-economic backgrounds.


